Area III Conference

Olithia O'Toole, (pictured above on the left) is our new Area III Director. She is a wonderful woman who is just full of stories and has a twinkle in her eye. We had a delicious breakfast followed by Martha Zaragoza-Diaz (next to Olithia) speak to us on current legislative matters in Sacramento. A final report will be sent to you via email if you want to read what every bill is about and where it stands: whether signed, is on "Watch," or is still in committee. Here's what I heard, but others who went may have more information for you.

Martha told us that the hottest thing in education right now is RTTP, which stands for Race to the Top. It's competing for federal funding and California is racing to be eligible to apply for grant money in the first cycle. If a state is not chosen for the first cycle, they may reapply for second round...but it is feared that money will not be available then. States selected will have 1) the highest quality of standards and data systems to support education, 2) effective teacher and principal evaluation, and 3) support for low performing schools. For the second reason above Senate Bill 19 was already signed. It eliminated the "firewall" that prevents data (testing) information to be used to evaluate teachers and principals. Unions are lobbying for other measures to be included...not just test data. We know as educators, how test results can vary from school to school, and class to class, and from year to year. Some of the hardest work I have ever done has been with classes that had many students with a myriad of learning difficulties and instructional challenges, yet those were the years that test results may have been at their lowest. She spoke about the *America Competes Act*. California is trying to increase the supply of high quality charter schools, and put an emphasis on highly qualified science, technology, english and math teachers. The API scores will be changed to provide for a growth model, and the "District of Choice" model will be studied. (That's when a student can readily transfer from one school to another or even from other districts.) The times they are a changing, that's for sure. Stay tuned for what's going to happen next.
